# BOURNE COMMUNITY BOATING 2006: A BRIEF HISTORY.

Is boating "nice?" Mole asks in the first chapter of Kenneth Grahame's book, The Wind in the Willows."Nice?" the Water Rat replies. "It's the ONLY thing," he says. "Believe me, my friend, there is NOTHING-absolutely nothing-half so much worth doing as simply messing about in boats."

There are some people in Bourne who feel the same way, saying they've spent some of the happiest hours of their lives "messing around in boats.", Diana Barth, Bourne Enterprise, Friday, March 23, 2007.

In the fall of 2006, Dave Foynes and I were discussing the fact that Bourne with one of the longest coastlines in the state did not have a youth saltwater sailing Program for the local youth of Bourne. Would it be possible to start one, and if so, how?

A couple of weeks later, while out fishing, I came across Ken Legg. I asked him if he knew anything about youth sailing programs. He said yes, a lot! I told him what Dave and I were thinking and he said, "Let's do it"

(Cont.) In the past, he had served as Commodore of the Buzzards Yacht Club, and his son, Josh, had been a head sailing instructor. They were both experienced sailors and racers. He also has a good friend, Jen Kano, who practically wrote the cookbook of youth sailing, including staff skills, lesson plans, games, and having fun on the water safely while learning to sail! So in the fall and winter, we put our heads together, Our first organized meeting was on December 3, 2006. With snow flying outside we had lots to do. Meeting around the wood-burning stove at Parkers Boat Yard. Key participants were: Dave, Ken, and I, Bruce and Patty Parker, Tina Canterbury, Mark Mahoney Jen Kano, and Dave O'Hara, (our newly appointed executive directors.)

Gene Curry had filed Articles of Organization with the State. Joe Murphy, who would be our accountant, was working on obtaining 501C 3 status for BCB. Toby Baker had donated a rib.

During the following meetings, it was decided that we needed 8 Opti Prams to start the program. Amazingly, within a month we had donations to purchase the prams. The following people stepped up to the plate: The Legg, Bushueff, Foynes, Hough &Picard family, Mark Mahoney, Stephen Cucchiaro, Joseph Morin, Scott Zein/Kingman Yacht Center,.

We set the tuition as a \$50.00 BCB membership to Bourne year-round residents. Enrollment for 48 students in 4 four-week sessions, morning and afternoon. We were able to raise \$50,000 to cover first-year expenses, and we needed every bit of it. BCB leased the beachfront from the Mashnee Village Corporation next to the "grill" on the Island.

BCB established a program of sailing 4 days a week plus Belly Biology" 1 day a week. Marine biology instruction was provided by Jason Cassista from Briarwood. Eric Bevins of the "grill" let us set up a biology lab under the deck where each class had their own aquarium of saltwater critters. We started with 12 kids and 3 instructors per session. Tina Canterbury brought the teachers for evening sails.

This was to be a community program. Parents and friends handled check-ins, served as beach parents, ran the cookouts, Volunteered to paint the donated benches, and made a BCB flag pole out of a cedar post. Much was donated. Volume One of the "Bourne Sailor" newsletter highlights the support BCB received from the Bourne Community

Ken said to me, contributing to the community in this way, "will be one of the most rewarding experiences of your Life." Bourne Community Boating is looking for volunteers for this year to continue this popular Bourne family program..




#### From the Purser: Financial Update





#### Noteworthy changes include-

Four-week classes- BCB classes were traditionally 4 weeks long, which is ideal for improving sailing skills, confidence, and progression through the program. Now that we have fully ramped up our schedule and staffing after the COVID years, we are delighted to offer the 4-week program again for our beginner, advanced beginner, and intermediate classes. This is the best choice for youngsters aiming to become self-reliant sailors and for those aspiring to eventually enter into the junior instructor and instructor programs.

One-week classes- Recognizing that not every child wants to commit to a four-week program and some may want to know if sailing is for them before committing to a longer class, we have incorporated 1-week classes into the 2024 plans.

Bullseye class: In the morning, we will have up to 4 students with 1 instructor in a bullseye sailboat. Depending on skill levels when entering, by the end of the week, kids should feel comfortable in a sailboat, enjoy some nice sailing trips around Phinneys Harbor, and even get comfortable at the helm.

Sailapalooza: In the afternoon, we will bring back this fun-centric, less structured course. This class will emphasize experience with different boats and exploring sailing trips in the area. This was a popular class, first introduced in 2012 and we look forward to bringing it back for 2024.

Mummichogs (chogs): Tailored for our youngest sailors, we will continue to offer the very popular 1-week mummichog class throughout the summer. As always, marine biology remains at its core, underscored by our unique belly biology curriculum.

Full-day option- Catering to families seeking an all-day program or for children who can't get enough sailing, we are introducing a flexible full-day option. It is simply a matter of signing up for both a morning and an afternoon class. For instance, the beginner or advanced beginner morning students can elect to add Sailapalooza in the afternoon. And vice versa for afternoon students who elect to take the morning bullseyes class. This will be new and it will be the first time that students will be at BCB through the lunch hour. We foresee a laid-back, supervised beach lunch and possibly the birth of new BCB traditions during the lunch hour (pizza Friday anyone?).

Combined learn to race and adventurers- While racing has not been BCB's focal point, there are invariably students who are keen on learning to race. Our instructors note that racing offers an engaging means for the students to sharpen their sailing acumen. Previously, our most experienced sailors, had to choose between the racing and the adventurer's class. Next year, we will combine these 2 classes into one four week class. Depending on the daily preferences and prevailing weather, the class will pivot between racing skills and sailing escapades.

## Plans for 2024

We have many new plans to come in 2024 including a new 4-week schedule and an all-day option for students as well as continuing to provide equal opportunity and access to sailing for all ages. We are looking forward to starting a new schedule and incorporating more "belly bio" into our curriculum as the last few years it had phased out. We already have some field trips lined up and can't wait to share them with you!
