We were finally able to erect both of our sheds and our tent and were fortunate in having a summer of splendid weather which always makes for a good season. Our beginners and intermediate sailors seemed to advance faster and further than in the past and this may have been the result of better instruction as we grow wiser from year to year, as well as the great weather. All in all the season was another success.

As we start to plan next year's programs we enter into another transition. Jan Kano will be leaving us. She has been involved in BCB since the beginning and has been head instructor the past 3 years. It's no exaggeration that BCB would not exist without the guidance and participation of Jen. She is a passionate teacher whom the kids relate to and whom we will miss dearly. Her contributions to the program are incalculable. Our new Head instructor will have very large sea boots to fill!

After four years as a founder and President of BCB, I am going to step down as President. I will remain on the Board and am fully committed to furthering the mission of BCB. I think it's important to have a turnover of leadership in all organizations, particularly one that is volunteer driven. Cheryl Millikan, who is a teacher, mother of two of our

students, and volunteer coordinator for the past two years is

succeeding me as

From the Crow's Nest: BCB's 2011 Sailing Program

BCB is preparing for next year's boating program. We will continue to focus on our core programs. However, *there* are some significant changes

- All programs will be open to seasonal and year-round Bourne Residents. There will be no advanced registration period for year-round residents as in prior years. However, scholarships will only be available to Bourne year-round residents.
- There will be two different beginner offerings:

 The regular 4 week program to be offered in the morning; And a two week Youth Beginner program in the afternoon Designed for older children (without Belly Biology classes.)
- The intermediate program will remain the same with minor adjustments including sailing in other types of boats.

- The Adventures in Sailing program will be reduced to a two week, 5 days per week, session
- The Adult Learn-to-Sail program and Parent program will be one day per week, to better accommodate people's schedules
- BCB, in coordination with CapeAble
 Adventures, will further develop the
 Bourne to Sail adaptive sailing program
 for sailors with disabilities. Suitable water
 access is the challenge to this program.
- The Junior instructor program will be expanded for 4th and 5th year participants.

Beginners – Monday-Friday, 8:30 am to 12 noon- Two 4 week sessions

Four days a week students will receive instruction in the principles and skills of sailing in Vanguard Prams (Optis). Students will learn to row, sail, tie knots, apply the rules of the road, and do some basic chart reading.

Our goal is to have each child sailing independently The fifth day will be devoted to marine biology and shore-side ecology (Belly Biology). The program is open to seasonal and full time residents of Bourne and who will be entering grades 4-6 this fall.

Youth Learn-to-Sail— Monday-Friday, 1 pm to 4:30 pm Two 2 week sessions

Students will learn to the basics of rowing, sailing, and the rules of the road, children will be encouraged to sail independently. The program is open to seasonal and full time residents of Bourne and who will be entering grades 6 and up this fall.

Students can spend 2 to 3 years in these classes before graduating to the intermediate class.

Intermediates - Monday-Friday, 1 pm to 4:30 pm- Two 4 week sessions



To qualify for this class the student should be able to sail singlehanded on all points of sail.

This program builds on the beginner/advanced beginner foundation

skills in all areas: rowing and boat handling, sailing skills, navigation, and rules of the road. It will also introduce basic racing, and provide some experience in other types of sailboats and windsurfers. All instruction will be with one student per boat. Sailing instruction will be 4 days a week with advanced Belly Biology one day per week. Students may spend from one to three years in this class.



Adventures in Sailing – Monday-Friday, 1 pm to 4:30 pm -Two 2 week sessions

To qualify for this class the student should have strong basic single-handed pram sailing skills including the ability to sail upwind efficiently. In general the student should be entering the 7th or 8th grades. Students entering the 6th grade with very strong skills may be eligible for this

class. Students will strengthen their single-handed sailing skills in Lasers, learn sloop sailing skills in Capri 14s, and wind surfing skills on Techno 293s. There will also be more exposure to racing, and seamanship skills. Big boat sailing will be part of the program and will include an all-day sail during the last week of the session.

Junior Instructor Program

To qualify for this program the student must have excellent pram and sloop sailing skills, and a strong desire to continue to expand his/her sailing skills and experience. Students will be expected to assist in teaching 3-4 class sessions per week, attend a weekly class in which they will learn how to teach sailing effectively; and sail independently during open sailing or join in with the Adventurers 1-3 times per week. (Total time commitment = 5 sessions per week minimum.)

Adult Group Sailing Instruction – Schedule to be determined

Learn-to-sail for adults is taught in Capri 14's or wind surfers. Classes will include shore school and on-the-water instruction.

Open Sailing – Schedule to be determined

This summer, qualified members may use Opti's, Capris, windsurfers, and the Hobie 17. Members can qualify by attending a course (Intermediate Sailing, Adult Sailing, etc.) or by passing a test that includes rigging, sailing skills, and a swim check. As our fleet expands, so will the offerings for open sailing. This means that for an individual the \$50 membership fee or \$75 for a family membership provides 8 weeks of sailing—a huge bargain!! So, please plan on taking advantage of this program during the summer of 2011.

Bourne to Sail - Adaptive sailing- Schedule under development

BCB, in partnership with CapeAble Adventures, will expand the the Bourne to Sail program for sailors with disabilities. There will be at least two scheduled clinics. These clinics will be offered to allow people to come for a trial sail with or without an experienced partner..

Depending on disability, sailing will be offered in two Access Dingies and Capris 14's. The extent of offerings will depend on available facilities. suitable



boats and the availability of experienced care givers. Please volunteer your skills.

Fleet expansion In support of our growing programs, we will be seeking to acquire 7-9 additional Vanguard Prams, another Laser, and windsurfer.

All programs are subject to change as we tailor our resources to the Bourne community's needs and interests. Complete program descriptions and a schedule of fees and scholarships will be posted on our web site.

Taffrail Log: BCB Summer 2009 Program

You know what they say about lemons... if that's what you get handed—make lemonade! And we got handed a basket of big fat ones early in 2010 when we lost our base of operations on Mashnee Island. It was a severe blow to all of us but it hit me especially hard. I had grand visions of the facility we could have there someday in that perfect location. Not to mention the three great seasons we had already had there. It was like losing the family homestead and facing living out of your car.

A lot of scrambling went on as we searched for the new 'perfect' location. Nothing seemed to totally fit the bill, and time was getting short. We finally settled on having our land-base at the Bourne Marina in Monument Beach (thanks to the generosity of the Town of Bourne and Tim Mullen and the Department of Natural Resources) and leaving our water-base in the same location off Mashnee Island. This presented some logistical challenges. We need another power boat, and we needed Coast Guard licensed

drivers in order to transport the kids across the harbor from Mo Beach to Mashnee. More scrambling ensued as the staff and I went through the long process of training, background checks, physical exams and drug testing necessary to get our licenses. And the whole time, I also tried to envision how we were going to do all the transporting and still have time to run a good class. Eventually I realized that it was not going to work, and we decided to extend the class time by half an hour from three to thee and a half hours.

With much trepidation, we launched our 4th season in the field next to the parking lot at the marina. Decked out with our trusty tent and storage sheds, our new location started to feel like home right away. And indeed, things went beautifully right from the start. The extra half-hour proved to be perfect—we had enough time to run a good class, and it wasn't so long that the kids ran out of steam by the end. Best of all, our new neighbors were actually glad we were there. Loads of people completely unrelated to the program stopped by to say "hi" and tell us how nice it was to have us there and how happy they were that we were still operating. The town DNR folks were extremely supportive of us and we co-existed splendidly though out the summer. The beach there worked out beautifully for our picnics, and the open space in the field was great for active games and sailing land-drills.

The classes themselves also went really well. But that was no surprise to me. With three highly successful summers under our belts, and three veteran instructors returning, we really couldn't go too far wrong. Hats off to Dan Montt, one of our original instructors 4 years ago, and Heather Valeri for their exceptionally strong performances as our senior instructors. I'm so proud of both of them and how far they have come as instructors. Not only are they great teachers, the kids love them so much that some were crying in their arms on the last day! They are both moving on to new challenges in life, and we wish them well. Fortunately, both Matt Phillips and Sarah Bouchie will be returning for 2011 to provide the staff some continuity. The kids love them, and they both have the potential to become great lead instructors. I hope they will be with BCB for several years to come.

And last but certainly not least—some sailing highlights! For me, the intermediate's circumnavigation of Toby Island always stands out, and this summer was no exception. It's a big adventure for small boats and takes solid sailing skills to get all the way around the island, under the bridge, and back to the pram float in less that 3 hours. Both sessions of this year's intermediates had a lot of fun and got a great feeling of accomplishment, and it made my heart sing to watch over them while they did it. The other event that stands out in my mind was seeing the B session beginners on the last day, sail upwind from the pram float out to the

spectator float in a pretty darn stiff breeze (a little stiffer than we would have liked), do their demonstrations for their parents, and sail back to the float with obvious skill, confidence and style. Remember that just 4 weeks before most of them didn't know the first thing about sailing. It still give me goosebumps when I think about it!

So there you have it. The best darn batch of lemonade you ever tasted, whipped up from a pretty gnarly looking basket of lemons!!

My four years with BCB have been very rewarding and loads of fun! Being involved with a start-up and helping to plan a new program from scratch was exhilarating and satisfying on so many levels. From the Ship's Carpenter: Fleet status A message from the Fleet Captain:



Bourne Community Boating is working hard to give you and your children an opportunity to find passion in your lives. As I said, this doesn't come from simple exposure but rather engaging with others. To that end, I invite you all to find ways to share experiences with others.

Last year the BCB fleet grew with the addition of 2 Lasers, each with 3 different sized sailing rigs. Also we added a 19 foot Carolina Skiff to help us transport students from Monument Beach to the Mashnee site.

The fleet is growing again this year. In an effort to get beginners and intermediates sailing solo more often we needed to increase the number of prams from 16 to 24 so everyone can have her or his own boat. The prams we have are no longer in production and because we didn't want to have a mixed fleet a lot of effort has been put into finding used prams for sale. Although they aren't as rare as hen's teeth it was pretty darned close! We have managed to find 9 more which is the good news. The not-so-good news is that 8 of them are in the midwest. These will be picked up and brought back to Bourne once the weather is a little more kindly (hopefully in March).

A big thank you goes to Barlow's Boat Yard who has been more than generous, giving us a whole corner of their yard for storing boats which now number 38 before our new additions roll in! A second big thank you goes to Marty Starr who helped get the fleet ready to go. Lots of others

helped along the way during the launching and hauling which is fast and furious for 6 hours or so each way.

So this May or June when the call goes out for help, share the experience with a friend, a sibling, an offspring or perhaps someone you don't really know yet and help us get the BCB fleet in the water!
